Grammar

- Infinitives: use of infinitive forms after certain verbs and expressions.
- Imperatives: giving orders, instructions, or advice.
- Present perfect: use for experiences and recent events.
- Past simple vs. present perfect: identifying when to use each.
- Comparatives and superlatives: regular and irregular forms.
- Modal verbs: can, could, should, have to – form and use.
- Future forms:
 - *will* for promises and predictions.
 - *going to* for plans and intentions.

- *present continuous* for fixed arrangements.
- Adjectives vs. adverbs: identifying and using correctly.
- Countable vs. uncountable nouns: differentiation and quantifiers (some, any, much, many).

Lexis (Vocabulary)

- Travel and transport: means of transport, travel services, related compound nouns.
- Leisure activities: hobbies, pastimes, and weekend plans.
- Food and drink: vocabulary related to meals, restaurants, and menus.
- Town and city: places in town, describing locations and directions.
- Nature and animals: animal names and sounds, environment terms.
- Synonyms and antonyms: improving reading and vocabulary comprehension.

Functions

- Giving advice: using *should*.
- Making suggestions: polite suggestions with modals.
- Making requests: with *can*, *could*, and *would*.
- Describing habits and routines: with present simple and adverbs of frequency.
- Talking about past experiences: using present perfect and past simple.
- Planning and predicting: with *going to*, *will*, and present continuous.

- Giving directions: using prepositional phrases and landmarks.
- Describing places and people: using appropriate adjectives and intensifiers.

Pronunciation

- Focus on:
 - *-ed* endings in past simple.
 - Word stress in compound nouns.
 - Intonation in questions vs. statements.
 - Common pronunciation errors in modals and comparatives.
